BARCELONA

The capital of Catalonia is a Mediterranean and cosmopolitan city with Roman ruins, medieval quarters and the most beautiful examples of **20th century Modernism and avant-garde**. Emblematic constructions by the Catalan architects Antoni Gaudí and Lluís Domènech i Montaner have been declared **World Heritage Sites** by UNESCO.

TARRAGONA
30' From Barcelona



Its Roman past still imprints its urban and Mediterranean character. Tarragona keeps its medieval spirit, palpable in its walls, its cathedral, its amphitheater, its aqueduct or its Archaeological Museum. No doubt why it was designated **World Heritage in 2000**.



MADRID

The historic part of Madrid is brimful with art, history and culture, the site of buildings such as the Prado Museum, one of the world's major art collections. Its lively streets offer an exciting nightlife and a varied, year-round cultural calendar. This, combined with its gastronomy, as well as the exceptional surrounding areas, some of which have the World Heritage designation, are just some of the factors which make Madrid such a successful choice.

TOLEDO
33' From Madrid



Toledo is one of the Spanish cities with the greatest wealth of monuments. Known as the "city of the three cultures", because Christians, Arabs and Jews lived together there for centuries, behind its walls Toledo preserves an artistic and cultural legacy that makes its old quarter a real open-air museum.



SEGOVIA
26' From Madrid



Its old quarter of which, along with its Roman aqueduct, are World Heritage Sites, lies on high ground between the Eresma and Clamores Rivers. In addition to its famous aqueduct, numerous Romanesque churches, the Cathedral and Fortress form a magnificent landscape in Castile.



VALENCIA

There are few cities like Valencia, able to combine the remnants of its ancient history-- dating to the year 138 BC-- with the most innovative and avant-garde buildings from the new millennium, such the City of Arts and Sciences.

Thanks to its location, Valencia has historically been a very important Mediterranean port, also hosting the most important sailing race in the world: the America's Cup.

CUENCA
56' From Valencia



In the region of Castile-La Mancha, you will find this city with the UNESCO World Heritage designation for its wealth of monuments. Its historic center looks out over rocky canyon walls in the heart of the Cuenca Mountains. The cobbled streets, Cathedral, the famous Hanging Houses juxtaposed with the modern Museum of Abstract Art charm the most hardened traveler.

MADRID

This thousand-year-old World Heritage city is a living legacy of the different cultures that settled here throughout its history. If you walk round the old quarter you will discover a beautiful network of alleyways, squares and white-washed courtyards surrounding the Great Mosque-Cathedral, which reflects the importance of the city in the Middle Ages, and is the symbol of the city.

SEVILLE

Modern, high-spirited, and, above all, passionate. Its warm climate is ideal for experiencing everything Seville has to offer: a ride around the city's most emblematic monuments in a horse-drawn carriage, a round of tapas in the bars and terraces of the old town, shopping in the lively commercial areas, a flamenco show in one of the city's "tablaos".

MÁLAGA
